Holy Trinity Church Giving Thanks for 125 years of God's Love and Mercy By Ken Szczesniak

Holy Trinity Church, the seat of Polish identity in Utica and the surrounding Mohawk Valley, is celebrating its 125th Anniversary this year! The large grey Church, bordering the North-South Arterial, is an iconic structure built by our ancestors as a place to worship, to celebrate, to honor, and give thanks for all the blessings bestowed. Our ancestors established a parish within the city to provide not only for spiritual needs but to support and continue our beloved Polish culture.

The early Poles sacrificed much to ensure that this culture would continue for generations within this region and established the Parish through the benevolent society of St. Stanislaus Bishop and Martyr in 1896. The society raised money as early as 1894, when \$79 was collected for the purpose of starting a parish.

On December 25, 1896, the newly ordained and newly assigned Pastor, Rev. Simon Pniak said the first Mass in the name of Holy Trinity Church at St. John's school hall in Utica for the Polish people. Within a couple years, the Parish had purchased a wooden house to use as a chapel and built a brick church for the community. While this building was sufficient for a time, the evergrowing Polish community during the early part of the 20th century sought the need for a larger space.

On May 22, 1910 the current church building was blessed after four years of construction and a total cost of \$150,000.

Mikalajunas and Val Elacqua for donating the basket items.



























Goming this Fall to the Kopernik Gultural Genter

Polish Folk Tales and Legends Exhibit

In recognition of Polish Heritage Month this October, the Kopernik Cultural Center will feature a new display in its main room. With the guidance of Pawel Dworek, three well known legends will be presented. The selection includes the **Legend of the Three Brothers Lech, Czech and Rus**.



The three brothers are symbolic founders of three Slavic states – the brother Lech (founder of the early Poland), Czech (founder of the Czech Republic), and Rus (associated with Russia in many popular versions of the legend, but more probably telling about the Ruthenian people). The display will include a reenactors costume of Lech.

The second legend, The Trumpeter of Krakow,

takes place in the ancient capital of Poland. This 13th century tale tells of the city's watchman in the tower of the church

of St. Mary's located in the Market Square. He alerts the inhabitants of imminent danger to the city by playing the 'Hejnal' as the hoard of Tatars approaches the city. He repeats the melody four times but it ends abruptly on a broken note as an arrow pierces his throat.





The third is the gruesome tale of **Prince Popiel**, a 9th -century Slavic ruler, and his German wife, Brunhilda, who were eaten alive by a horde of mice in their tower.

This unsavory end was the consequence of the pair's unholy deeds. A diorama of a scene from the tale is being designed by Janet Kosuda Dwyer and Barbara Krauza using a hand-felting technique of the characters.

Lastly, a dramatization of the legend of **Smok the Dragon of Wawel Castle** will be presented in the White Eagle room adjoining the Cultural Center. The production will welcome children and teens interested in acting out this famous story set in Krakow, the ancient capitol of Po-

land which is beset by a fearsome fire-breathing dragon. The city is delivered from this menace by an astute young shoemaker who receives the hand of the daughter of Prince Krak in gratitude.

Kopernik Association Mourns Longtime Active Supporter, Philanthropist

Sally L. Maka 1939 - 2021

ROME - Sally L. Majka, 81, passed away on Thursday, January 28, 2021, peacefully in the comfort of her home.

Sally was born on February 5, 1939, in Utica, the daughter of Adam and Bertha (Willgos) Lachut. On June 26, 1966, Sally married Donald J. Majka in Holy Trinity Catholic Church, a blessed and mutually supportive union of 54 years. Sally grew up in a modest home on Spring St., in the brewery district of West Utica. She attended Holy Trinity School and UFA. After high school, she earned a Bachelor's Degree from Utica College and continued her education at Syracuse University where she earned a Master's Degree in Education. Later, she attended Catholic University, Washington, D.C., attaining a Master's Degree in Library Science. Her great love was the teaching of children. She taught at Vernon-Verona-Sherrill, Potter's School in Utica's inner city and Fairfax County School District, Fairfax, Virginia.



Sally can be characterized by a statement that she made at her retirement celebration, "Some of my days were good, all of the rest were wonderful." After retirement, Sally returned to Utica where she was involved in volunteer work for political, educational and civic organizations. Eventually, she joined the staff of Congressman Sherry Boehlert and was elected to the Board of Trustees at Utica College. She was a generous person, having established scholarships at Utica College for students in need. She also funded several prizes for the Utica College Science Fair. Sally also was a conservationist working with Don to manage 1,000 acres of forest land and planting 60,000 seedling trees in the north country. She was also an avid quilter.

She is survived by her beloved husband, Donald, Rome; and her sister, Pauline Lachut, Whitesboro. Sally will be missed by those who loved her.

The Sally and Don Majka Legacy

In 2017, Sally and Don Majka honored the Kopernik Memorial Association by establishing the Copernicus awards presented during the Utica College Regional Science Fair. The awards are presented to a recipient in the Junior (gr. 7-9) division and Senior (gr. 9-12) Division. At this event, inspiring student work from several area schools is displayed and judged. To qualify, students had to first win at their own district's science fair.

The 42nd Annual Utica College Regional Science Fair was held on March 27th and concluded with a virtual Awards Ceremony on the 30th. It was announced that the Junior Grand Prize has been named in Sally and Don's honor. Sadly, Sally's passing in January was sensed and their longtime presence in support of the fair was missed. They will continue to support students pursuing their education and interests in the sciences as a result of the Majka endowment to the college, with 12 special awards presented annually.

This year's Copernicus awards were presented to Emily Smith, 8th Grader from Poland Central School and Louis Misiaszek, a senior from Whitesboro Senior High School.

We offer Don and his family our deepest condolences as well as our continued support during this difficult time. We have been blessed to have them part of our association.


Local Polish History Attracts Hundreds by Rebecca McLain, Executive Director, Oneida County History Center

On January 26, 2021 Utica native Patricia Bury Yocum was invited to give a virtual lecture for the Oneida County History Center on Polish Immigration in Utica. Librarian emerita at the University of Michigan, Patricia has had a lifelong interest in studies of Polish immigration and Polish genealogy. She previously spoke in 2016, on Utica's Polish community's contributions to World War I and attracted 80 guests including many members of the Kopernik Memorial Association. We knew this talk would be popular, but didn't know just how many it would draw. "They Came to Work: The Early Polish Immigrants of West Utica" drew 300 registrants and over 200 participants, making it the biggest virtual lecture ever hosted by the History Center! This fascinating lecture focused on Patricia's quest to trace several local families who immigrated to the United States starting in the 1880s and lived in West Utica. It serves as both a story about the Polish history in the region and an inspiration to others who may want to research their family history through city directories, newspapers, archives, and other sources.
