### -Chłopi: A Spectacular Adaptation

Niech będzie pochwalony Jezus Chrystus!" ("Praised be Jesus Christ!") — these were the words that the readers of Tygodnik Ilustrowany magazine read on January 18, 1902, more than 122 years ago. It was the first installment of Władysław Stanisław Reymont's *Chlopi*. Once compiled, the four-volume novel (*Jesień*, *Zima, Wiosna* and *Lato*), published between 1904-1909, would earn the author the Nobel Prize in Literature in 1924.

The well-known *starodawne* phrase is also the greeting of the beggar woman Agata to the Parish Vicar in the opening of the 1972 Polish television serial *Chlopi* (*The Peasants*). The approximately 11-hour, 13-part epic was watched with great interest by every household in Poland. (continued on page 3)

Director Jan Rybkowski decided to adapt this extraordinary book to the screen. He did not try to force his own interpretation of the Reymont work. Rather, he remained faithful to the content and character of the book.

**IT IS THE STORY ABOUT** the Boryna family and other inhabitants of the village of Lipce in Central Poland's Łowicz region at the turn of the 19th/20th centuries in all its colorful diversity, wealth and poverty. The Borynas are farmers, and their son is expected to follow in the family tradition. The already prickly relationship of the father and son is strained to the breaking point when both fall in love with the same woman.

In Lipce, people live piously, work hard, endure their fate humbly and deeply believe in divine justice. Both in the novel and in the film, the life of peasants is inextricably intertwined with the rhythm of nature and the liturgical rhythm – related to both the Catholic and the seasonal calendars. Covering 10 months, it begins at the end of September and ends at the end of July.

The story is played out against a richly detailed period backdrop. Authentic costumes and props from the era were used, belonging to the village inhabitants, many of whom appeared as extras.

In the 1970s attendance at cinemas was steadily dropping off. Television was developing rapidly, along with the production of films and serials – many were of a very high artistic standard giving young directors and cameramen a chance to make a debut on their own.

While shooting the footage, Rybkowski crafted a shorter version for cinemas utilizing a storyboard with a narrower perspective – focusing on the two most important characters, Maciej Boryna and Jagna Paczesiówna. The  $2^{3}$ /4 hour theatrical film premiered in 1973.

The reason for the film was the fact that at that time most people had small black-and-white television sets, which would not allow them to experience visual impressions related to the colorful attire, the decoration of peasant huts, and shots showing nature or the uniqueness of the folklore scenes.

**I INTENTLY WATCHED THE FILM** version on DVD first ... wow! Then, I devoted myself to a marathon viewing of the lengthy series ... spectacular! It is a cinematic and cultural masterpiece, capturing this moment in time with such respect and authenticity! I can't recommend the full version enough.

All the stories, traditions, customs, rituals, work activity, gestures, proverbs, superstitions, and mindset that my parents and grandparents told me about and the pride they instilled in me are in this microworld of old Poland. The culture that I studied abroad and since, along with religious holidays and folk festivities are fully on display. *Chlopi* is a portrait of our family ancestors — those who remained on their native land and those who, as a result of social transformations in Poland, left the countryside.

The 13 episodes are titled: Boryna, Jarmark (the Fair), Zrękowiny (Handshake), Wesele (Wedding), Gody (Winter Solstice/ Mating), Ogień (Fire), Bór (the Forest), Gospodynie (Women's Circle) Wielkanoc (Easter), Śmierć Boryny (Boryna's death), Scheda (Inheritance), Powroty (the Return), and Zemsta (Revenge).

**THE EPISODE "EASTER"** is a real feast for the eyes. Original customs, palms, *pisanki* Easter eggs, decorations, and the contrast between the table setting at Boryna household and the wealthy landowning Dziedzic family. You won't find such beautiful and refined shots of Easter customs in any other Polish film.

The pussywillow palms are decorated with sprigs of boxwood (*bukszpan*), the typical Easter evergreen. In earlier scenes, Christmas and winter rituals are particularly shown in great detail.

Filming was conducted in the authentic, properly "aged" villages of Lipce, Pszczonów, and Strzelcew near Łowicz. In addition to professional and accomplished actors, residents of the towns appeared as extras. The older hosts were eager to support the film crew with advice, stories, costumes, and period props.

Jan Rybkowski admitted in one of the interviews that he wanted to recreate the reality

described by Reymont as faithfully as possible: "This is the last moment when it was possible to photograph the remains of folklore that is disappearing before our eyes."

It is an enlightening education. As depicted, there are colloquial expressions, curses, angry responses, and proverbs that you would never learn in Polish school.

Costume designer Marta Kobierska's goal was to be guided by the descriptions of clothing in Reymont's novel. Some attire was constructed by the Artistic Handicraft Cooperative in Łowicz, but the vast majority were original costumes brought for the film crew by people living in the Lipce area.

The value of the film is greatly enhanced by the acting performances of Władysław Hańcza as Boryna and Emilia Krakowska as Jagna.

Krakowska brilliantly conveyed the role's exuberant and lively temperament and is a luminous presence, even when silent. She showed Jagna as a character alienated and not understood by the community.

In the role of the patriarch of the family and village, Hańcza balances a mix of stoic pride, stubbornness, and fiery command. The scene of Boryna's death is iconic — impressionistic, archetypal, and mystical.

Jagna's overbearing, opinionated, and "holier-than-thou" mother Marcjanna "Dominikowa" Paczes is a force to be reckoned with. As portrayed by Jadwiga Chojnacka, she is a deliciously powerful villain. I have encountered such a woman at least twice in Polish circles and the interaction is not pleasant.

There is also no shortage of morally beautiful attitudes. Kuba takes care of young Witek, teaches him prayers, is honest, modest, hard-working, and humble. Tadeusz Fijewski, who played the supporting character built a moving, sometimes lyrical, sometimes almost terrifying character of the poor farmhand.

Hanka (sensitively and later forcefully portrayed by Krystyna Królówna) steadfastly defends her family, patiently fights for her husband's love, takes care of her father-in-law, and is resourceful, hard-working, and faithful.

The film is complemented by Adam Sławiński's soundtrack of atmospheric musical themes. This is supplemented by Church hymns, but it is the glorious folk music by Janusz Kaźmierczak and his folk kapela, the regional folk songs and *przyśpiewki* that gives the scenes a pulse and drive.

The stunning wedding sequence manages to capture each moment of ritual in a whirlwind of movement and color. Customs include the gathering procession to the church, bread and salt greeting, money plate, and the next day poprawiny, among others. With the traditional song "Oj chmielu, chmielu," the solemn transition to married woman status, Oczepiny is beautifully depicted.

I was addicted and mesmerized by this serial adaption; perhaps you will be as well.
